It is once again my privilege to serve as Cabinet Treasures. Thank you DG Walt for allowing me to serve on your cabinet.

One of the items that I stressed at the Officers training was that we need to be diligent in filing our informational returns with the IRS and the Franchise Tax Board. If your clubs does not bring in more than \$50,000.00 in **GROSS** income from both your administrative and project accounts for the fiscal year you can file the 990N (or E-Postcard) with the Internal Revenue Service and the 199 N with the Franchise Tax Board. Below is the information that was handed out at the training.

Criteria for filing with the Internal Revenue Service and the Franchise Tax Board for Lion's Years ending June 30, 2013 and forward Gross Income:

#### Internal Revenue Service: form 990 and electronic Form 990-N

Most small tax-exempt organizations whose annual gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less are required to electronically submit

Form 990-N, also known as the e-Postcard, unless they choose to file a complete form 990 or Form 990-EZ instead.

### Nonprofit unincorporated associations

All unincorporated associations, even if organized on a nonprofit basis, are subject to California income tax, until Franchise Tax Board grants tax-exempt status. So apply early to avoid paying California income tax.

File form 3500 with the Franchise Tax Board. Form available on line at <a href="www.ftb.ca.gov">www.ftb.ca.gov</a>. You will need to apply prior to filing form 199N.

Informational returns are due on or before November 15, 2013 so get your exemption request in for exemption as soon as possible.

# LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

The need for the work of LCIF never stops. There always seems to be something in the news where a natural disaster has occurred. Besides the emergency grants, LCIF gives grants for projects – such as Habitat for Humanity house building, vision care needs, playgrounds for physically handicapped children, plus many other things. All of the money LCIF gives comes from the donations to LCIF. I want to thank all the clubs and individuals who have given to LCIF this year. As of June 5<sup>th</sup>, our district has given \$123,050. I don't have the lastest numbers for MD-4's donations, but back in February, it was a little over \$306,000. So I know with money having been given in February through May, those numbers are higher.

I also want to thank the clubs who asked me to give a program for LCIF. I want to keep talking about LCIF, so please contact me if you would like a program.

Thanks for DG Dean letting the Saturday lunch at the District Convention be a Melvin Jones lunch. Unfortunately, there weren't any clubs ready to give a Melvin Jones award at the Convention. I appreciated our visiting ID's contributing remarks about LCIF. DGE Walt has already said we can have a LCIF lunch at our 2014 District Convention. That gives our 4-A2 clubs time to plan on having that a Melvin Jones Fellowship ordered to be presented at the Convention.

We also have several clubs that have money with LCIF that could either be used for a Melvin Jones Fellowship, or have money added to what is already there for a MJF. If any club wants to know how much money they have in undesignated, just ask me.

During this coming Lions year, I will continue my MJF "jar". For every donation of \$10, the person giving the money will have their name go into the jar. When there is \$1,000 collected, a name will be drawn and a MJF presented. So, for every \$10, your name will go in – for \$20, it will go in twice. I will have my MJF jar at each District meeting, and any time I visit a club. By the end of the Convention, I have collected \$210 dollars. Now I only need to get \$790 more and we can have the drawing for a MJF. I am hoping there will be enough money collected so a Melvin Jones Fellowship can be given at the 2014 Convention.

### HOW TO EARN TOP CLUB AWARD PART 1

You are a great Lions Club, doing great things for your community and world. And your members like being appreciated for their volunteer work.

You can help them get recognized! **If you are chairing a club project**, have one volunteer eep track of who was there to help, Lions and non-Lions. \*(1),(2),(3) Ask that person to keep a rough record of hours elped, not so much for individuals, but to come up with a total for that project. If your project had planning meetings, ou get to add those to the total.

Next, get another Lion to figure out how many people are being helped by your project. International loves this figure. If your project is a fundraiser, just do net money raised instead.

Then give those totals to your club secretary. That's it.

Now your secretary already has the job of reporting monthly to zone, district and International, and needs those figures. If your project crosses a month, the secretary should wait untill all the results are in and report the project as a whole.

- \*(1) Lion-hours are the hours each Lion worked. If ten Lions do a two-hour project, eport twenty Lion-hours.
- \*(2) for non-Lions, get their phone number, so you can call them again. Give it to your club's Membership chair, because they might make good Lions!
- \*(3) Keep the volunteer hours for each non-Lion along with that phone number, so your President can recognize their help at a club awards event or pizza party, maybe at the end of the year.

Volunteers from the Visalia Host Lions Club are fulfilling part of their service club's mission by screening the vision of children age 5 and younger.

Helen Keller, who was blind and deaf since she was 18 months old due to a fever,

challenged the Lions in 1925 to become "knights of the blind

in the crusade against darkness."

Allen Ventling of Visalia took up the cause after attending a convention in Tampa, Fla.

"There are 62 clubs in our district and nobody [else] does it," he said.

Once children get to school, their vision is tested by a school nurse. But by then, a child could be misdiagnosed with a learning disability instead of a vision problem.

"It's good to catch it early," he said.

Thanks to a \$1,000 grant from First 5 Tulare County, the Lions bought a PediaVision spot screening device to screen children's vision before they get to school. Standing a few feet away from the child in a darkened room, a volunteer such as Ventling points the device toward the child's face and waits for the child's eyes to dilate.

The PediaVision reads the child's vision and indicates whether the child needs another exam by an optometrist.

"It's so easy to do," he said. "It only takes five seconds."

It takes more time to fill out the paperwork than it does to screen a young child's vision using this portable, easy-to-use vision-screening system. Issues from near-sightedness to misalignment can be diagnosed quickly by nonprofessional volunteers.

"We are not eye specialists at all," said Carol Jones, Lions Club volunteer. "[We] can only recommend an eye exam."

During the first month, Lions Club volunteers screened 160 children at a Family HealthCare Network event and at the Women, Infants and Children offices in Tulare and Visalia.

Greetings to My Lion Brothers and Sisters .I want to share with you a Lion Project that is becoming dear to my heart.I was honored when PDG Don Allen asked me to be a trustee for Canine Companions. I love animals especially dogs. I am also fascinated by the fact that all through history dogs have played a role in the lives of humans. They were working dogs to the shepherds as they herded sheep along rugged terrain and companions to the Egyptian Queen Nefretiti. Today, they continue to gratify us,holding a place in our hearts as a beloved pet or to being a true service animal. Canine Companions are not guide dogs for the blind,. That is another wonderful organization. What they are is a magnificent highly trained animal capable of opening doors, picking up dropped keys, pushing buttons on elevators and even assisting with business transactions by transferring money, receipts and packages! The types of conditions that an individual seeking a service animal of this caliber are people mwith spinal cord injuries, cerebral palsy, spina bifida, etc. To request a service dog you must be at least 18. There are three other

types of service dogs trained at the CCI Northwest Regional Training Center in Santa Rosa. This is a sprawling multi-million dollar facility where highly specialized trainers, vetrinarians, breeders and puppy raisers come together to produce this miracle on four legs. There are some dogs after being observed at the facility, that are chosen for the hearing program . Trained to alert their owner to the doorbell, the phone ringing, a smoke alarm and I am just naming a few. PDG Don Allen told me that by the time these animals have finished their training they have a value of upwards of 35,000! Testimony after testimony of how these animals changed the life of a disabled individual with great challenges into a life that now held possibility, the stories will make you weep. What is the breed of a canine companion dog? Well, he is either a Labrador Retreiver a Golden Retreiver or a cross between thew two breeds . How much would you pay for a dog such as this if it could make such a dramatic impact in the quality of your life? What if I told you it costs the recipient nothing...the dog, the training, the follow-up is free. How can that be? Well, through the contributions of the service oriented. The two legged angels on Earth LIONS! I have just touched the surface of this miracle place. You can volunteer to be a puppy raiser where for 18 months you have the dog in your home, you take him or her to work with you, you socialize this intelligent animal and as you carry on your daily life your puppy is growing and she is in situations with YOU as her guide. When you have had her for 18 months the time comes You must now let her go. Back to the training facility for observation to determine where the best fit is for this particular animal, a heariung dog, a service animal, a facilitator dog? Your sad but you get another puppy and begin again, teaching loving encoraging and all of a sudden you find its you that is is benefitting maybe more than she is! Thats called a heart of service, a Lion's heart. After you leave the facility you wait for one final moment when all of this miracule comes together. GRADUATION DAY! Yes your baby is graduating. I have heard tell that there is not a dry eye in the training facility that day that emotions and hearts are beating with the sound of a job well done. A Leo can be a puppy raiser under the supervision of an adult. Or how about if an entire club joins hands to raise a pup. Yes he has to be placed with one individual but who's saying he or she can't have lots of aunts and uncles? Google Canine Companions and learn of the miracles. We need to raise a District 4A2 pup . To watch him or her go on to be the ears, the hands, of a child or adult in need. Consider making a generous donation so that this work may continue. Today with 1.35 million Lions in 207 countries and geographical areas, Lions have expanded their focus to help meet the ever-increasing needs of our global community.


Our programs are continually changing to meet new needs and greater demands, but our mission has never wavered: 'We Serve.'
