DISTRICT 4-A2 CABINET MEETING
Lions Clubs International Foundation Report – August 1, 2020

District Governor David wants me especially to give a report from the MD-4 Convention this past February. On Sunday morning, the 23rd, was the Melvin Jones Breakfast. Several clubs were recognized for their giving to the Foundation. We did have two clubs that turned in Pledge cards to be a Campaign 100 Model Club. For 100% Clubs, which up to June 2019, was \$20 a member. That amount is now \$50 a member. I have two plaques that I will need to get to the clubs that earned them. While the plaques say they are for 100% Participation (for the years 2016-17, 2017-18, and 2018-19), it was the 4th year for both Bakersfield Sports and McFarland. I also have an award for 100% participation for 2018-19 for Visalia Sequoia. A Melvin Jones Fellowship was presented to Lion Tony Reyes, Jr. (from Clovis Country). Lion Christy Kroell (Fresno Host) was given a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship (2nd Diamond) and PDG Tony Reyes, Sr. (Clovis Country) was also given a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship (3rd Diamond).

Due to the Coronavirus, a lot of our clubs have not been meeting and have not been able to do much fundraising. So, of course, giving is down to our Lions Clubs International Foundation. As a District, our giving for 2019/2020 was down to \$13,507.82. At the beginning of his year as District Governor, Governor Van pledged \$35,000 for our District. I know this could easily be a challenging year to make donations, but I would ask that each club would think about giving to LCIF. If every club gave at least \$50, we could be a 100% District. Try to be creative in a specific fundraiser for LCIF, I know there are people out there who can come up with some great ideas. Just before the MD-4 Convention in Visalia, we had a District LCIF Dinner, with Past International President Joe Preston coming to speak to us. We had a Silent Auction with a few items. It actually didn't go too badly for a first-time effort on my part. At that dinner, a few people offered some suggestions and some encouragement to do something again this year. It is kind of hard to plan something like that right now, so may have to come up with another idea. Like have an "LCIF Non-Dinner Fundraiser" via Zoom. Might be able to have a speaker or two, on Zoom that might be easier to get some Lions from outside of the District. Share LCIF information and maybe videos. Come up with some LCIF/Lions trivia games.

I can let clubs know how much money is in LCIF for their club in an unnamed category. And, to let people know if they have money accumulated towards a Melvin Jones Fellowship.

As you have heard before, LCIF is our Foundation. Every dollar given goes directly to LCIF, not one penny is taken out for any administrative costs.

I will be glad to come to your club and present a program. If you have any questions, contact me.

VISITATION CHAIR REPORT FOR DISTRICT MEETING OF August 1 & 2, 2020

GOOD MORNING DISTRICT GOVERNOR DAVID, VICE DISTRICT GOVERNORS DAVID AND FALGINI, VISITING DIGNITARIES, MEMBERS OF THE CABINET, FELLOW LIONS MEMBERS, LEOS AND GUESTS.

THIS IS OUR FIRST REPORT FOR THIS CABINET YEAR BUT COVERS LAST YEARS VISITATION PERIOD.

IN THE SMALL CLUBS, WE HAD 9 COMPETING. THOSE WERE BAKERSFIELD HOST WITH 334 POINTS, BAKERSFIELD SPORTS WITH 1,331 POINTS, FRESNO HOST WITH 439.8 POINTS, FRESNO UNLIMITED WITH 1,069.7 POINTS, McFARLAND LEOS WITH 4,262 POINTS, SELMA CHARTER WITH 617 POINTS, CLOVIS WITH 100 POINTS, PONDEROSA WITH 230 POINTS AND VISALIA SUNSET WITH 5,286 POINTS.

IN THE MEDIUM CLUBS WE HAD 8 IN COMPETITION; HANFORD BREAKFAST LIONS WITH 4,415.6 POINTS, McFARLAND LIONS WITH 1,850 POINTS, PARLIER LIONS WITH 240 POINTS, RICHGROVE LIONS WITH 2,615, VISALIA CHARTER OAK WITH 700 POINTS, VISALIA PRIDE WITH 4,526.6 POINTS, VISALIA SEQUOIA WITH 1,318 POINTS AND WEST COAST INDIAN CYBER LIONS CLUB WITH 2995.3 POINTS.

IN THE LARGE CLUB GROUP, WE HAD 4 CLUBS IN COMPETITION; KINGS CLUB WITH 3,532.8 POINTS, PORTERVILLE BREAKFAST WITH 2,491 POINTS, SELMA CENTRAL VALLEY LIONS LIONESS WITH 490 POINTS AND VISALIA HOST WITH 300 POINTS.

WINNERS OF THE BANNER PATCHES FOR LAST YEAR ARE IN THE SMALL CLUBS: IN 3RD PLACE IS BAKERSFIELD SPORTS WITH 1,531 POINTS (261.3 DIFFERENCE WITH FRESNO UNLIMITED), 2ND McFARLAND LEOS WITH 4,362 POINTS AND IN 1ST PLACE IS VISALIA SUNSET WITH 5,286 POINTS

IN THE MEDIUM CLUBS, IN 3RD PLACE IS THE WEST COAST CYBER CLUB WITH 1,331 POINTS, IN 2ND IS THE HANFORD BREAKFAST WITH 4,415.6 AND IN 1ST WITH JUST 111 POINTS MORE IS THE VISALIA PRIDE WITH 4,526.6 POINTS.

IN THE LARGE CLUBS, IN 3RD PLACE IS CENTRAL VALLEY LIONS LIONESS'S WITH 490 POINTS.

WE ARE GOING TO ACCEPT THE SAME VISITATION FORM AS IN THE PAST BUT WILL BE CALCULATING THE POINTS DIFFERENTLY. IF CLUBS MAKE A VISITATION AT A VIRTUAL CLUB MEETING, LIST "VIRTUAL" IN THE BLOCK FOR MILEAGE. CLUBS WILL RECEIVE 5 POINTS PER MEMBER FOR THE MINIMUM NUMBER OF ATTENDEES AND TRIPLE POINTS FOR ALL MEMBERS IN EXCESS OF THE MINIMUM. THE VISITATION FORM MAY BE SIGNED BY THE VISITED CLUB PRESIDENT OR SECRETARY ON LINE AND THEN EMAILED TO THE DISTRICT VISITATION CHAIR FOR TRACKING.

PLEASE REMEMBER IF YOU ARE GOING FOR YOUR SHORT TAIL OR LONG TAIL AWARD, I DO NOT KEEP A TALLEY ON INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS. THAT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY. ON THE DISTRICT WEBSITE THERE IS A COPY OF THE VISITATION FORM AND A FORM FOR YOU KEEPING TRACK OF YOUR SHORT TAIL VISITATIONS. THE FORM DOES SAY "SHORT TAIL TRACKING SHEET –Lion Cheri Provancha, Visalia Pride Lions". BUT YOU CAN CROSS THIS OFF AND PUT YOUR OWN NAME AND CLUB NAME UP THERE.

Good Morning Everyone

Protocol has been established, therefore "It's a great day to be a Lion"

I don't enjoy presenting negative statistics, however, after reviewing what we have accomplished the last few years, I found we have a limited amount of positive material. We closed year 2016-2017 with 2088 members we opened this year at 1753 members, we lost 335 members, that is a net loss of about 16% of our district's membership.

Our bright spot is new clubs, we managed to open one club every year, the down side we also close a club every year. We have several clubs that may face closure in the near future unless they decide to make the necessary changes to reverse their trends. I am always available to assist any club to reverse their negative membership trends. There is no magic wand it takes the desire, time, determination and effort to do the trick. We also have outside assistance from MD4 and LCI if it is needed. Our Region and Zone Chair Lions, our VDGs, GLT and Governor are challenged to assure you have everything you need to have a positive year.

New clubs are needed but current clubs should be our priority. They are established, they have a community that depends on them, the members are our brothers and sisters, etc., from my prospective, it is easier to save a member than find a new one. Also, it is easier to rebuild a club than to start another one. I have been successful doing both.

We have a lot of opportunities, 14 of our 62 clubs are under 20 members. 58% (33) of our clubs lost members and another 23% (14 clubs) had no change last year. Is your club one of these? Have you asked for assistance? Do you have the desire? Are you planning to close your club? If you planning to close we can help you do so in an orderly fashion. The Club can be reopened with new Lions and your community will continued to be served.

The Membership Trophy will go to a permanent home when the latest Club names are added. Three Rivers Club won the third quarter with plus 6 members, and Exeter Lions won the fourth quarter with Plus 8 members. We ended the 3-year contest with 12 Clubs named on the trophy and two clubs whose names appeared on the trophy three times; Three Rivers Lions and West Coast Indian Cyber Club. We have a tie for the trophy we can only have one winner so we will draw for the winning club. The Qwest Coast Indian Cyber Lions Club congratulation to both clubs for jobs well done.

Do we want another Trophy? The answer to this question was; yes, another three-year trophy

990EZ if your income (as stated above) is over \$50,000 but under \$250,000.

990N if your income for both accounts is under \$50,000

SI-100

If you are a corporation, the SI-100 needs to be filed every two years or you will get a penalty for not filing in a timely manner. Check the sos.ca.gov to see when your form was last filed. You will need the number supplied by the Secretary of State when you filed your incorporation papers.

1. Write letters to our Soldiers
2. Create cards for recipients of delivered meals (Meals on Wheels)
3. Call Seniors or others that are home bound.
4. Sew and donate face masks, or other needed articles
5. Identify families that need assistance and create and deliver food baskets
6. Set up a “go fund me” account asking for \$10 to get food to people that need it, purchase the food from local restaurants, then deliver!
7. Shop for groceries/essential items and deliver to homebound.
8. Volunteer at the local Senior Center if permitted.
9. Volunteer at the local food bank if permitted.
10. Put your clubs eye care program on-line so you can receive request, send out approval letters and pay for the exam and glasses all online.
11. Develop a game/puzzle for kids to do at home, have a new one every week.
12. Hold a blood drive if permitted, or donate blood
13. Hold a Farmers Market if permitted.
14. Hand out red and green sheets of paper to Seniors, ask them to put the green one in their window if all is well, the red one if they need someone to contact them.
15. Offer to host a “Zoom” meeting for Seniors to “get together” and chat
16. Had to cancel a club event/fundraiser? Donate gift cards and raffle prizes to shelters.
17. Use Zoom, Google Hangouts or other virtual media to read to or be read to by school children
18. Write letters to Santa for the Macy’s Believe Program to benefit Make-A-Wish (Melanie Hunter would be happy to provide info)
19. Write cards and/or letters to congratulation graduating high school students who may not have a graduation ceremony
20. Walk dogs and/or exercise pets of at-risk people who cannot go out to do so
21. Bathe and groom pets for seniors who can’t take them to their usual groomer
22. Mow lawns and do yardwork for seniors in our neighborhoods
23. Host virtual birthday parties for kids who can’t have real parties with their friends
24. Cut and split firewood for seniors and low-income families (in the forest – far away from other people)
25. Take garbage and recycling carts to the curb for pickup and put them back after pickup for at risk neighbors who are staying inside
26. Volunteer at local animal shelter (if permitted)

27. Many recycling centers are not operating right now. This is a great chance to post notices in your neighborhood and collect recyclables to benefit the charity of your choice. My club sends the pull tabs to Ronald McDonald House and puts all the rest of the money we earn from recycling towards Melvin Jones Fellowships for our members.
28. Plant a garden and donate the fresh produce to your local food bank, soup kitchen or school cafeteria (if permitted)
29. Deliver fresh flowers from your yard/garden to at risk people who are celebrating birthdays or anniversaries
30. Host a virtual sing along or jam session for kids
31. Record yourself teaching or sharing a special skill or talent you possess (i.e. virtual art lesson, music lesson, crochet lesson, etc.)
32. Collect favorite recipes from your friends, neighbors, club members and create a cookbook. Sell copies as a fundraiser.
33. Pet sit for people caring for sick family members
34. Sew curtains and/or bedspreads for your local women's shelter or camp facility
35. Host a virtual workout session
36. Set and check mouse and/or rat traps, roach traps, wasp traps for seniors and shut ins, replace light bulbs, or any other chore they may need assistance with.
37. Paint "kindness rocks" and leave them on the doorsteps of friends and neighbors.
38. Use sidewalk chalk to write cheerful, hopeful messages where neighbors, seniors and shut ins will see them.
39. If you have not already done so, research becoming an organ and tissue donor. If you find that this is something you are comfortable with, complete the donor registration process. Make sure you let your family members know of your desire to be a donor to avoid conflicts and misunderstandings in the future. Encourage your friends and loved ones to become informed about organ and tissue donation and make their own personal decisions.
40. If you are walking for fresh air and exercise, dial up your awareness of service opportunities. Watch for lost coins on the road, sidewalk, parking lot or trail. When you see them, pick them up and save them until you have enough to donate to your favorite charity. Carry a small pouch or bag with you. When you see nails, screws, broken glass or anything that could potentially damage tires or little bare feet, pick it up and discard it in a trash can along the way or at home. And be on the lookout for recyclable items. Pick them up and turn them in to add to your club's recycling fund.
41. ***This one came from a nine year old young lady who can't wait to be a Leo.*** Create some "Oopsie Poopsie" stations in your neighborhood or on the trails where you walk. Take a gallon milk jug, turn it upside down and cut a slot in one side. Paint the jug an attractive color. (Blue, green, gray. Something visible, but nothing you would not like to look at in your neighborhood.) Fill the jug with plastic bread bags, produce bags, grocery bags, etc. Attach the jug to a stake, fence post or other accessible spot along walking routes in your neighborhood. (Make sure you have the property owner's permission. Mailboxes, street signs, stop signs and power poles are off limits.) Create a laminated sign to let people know what the station is for. The one I saw said: "This is an Oopsie Poopsie station. If you forgot to bring a bag to clean up after you pet, help yourself to one of these. Please DO pick up the DOO DOO."

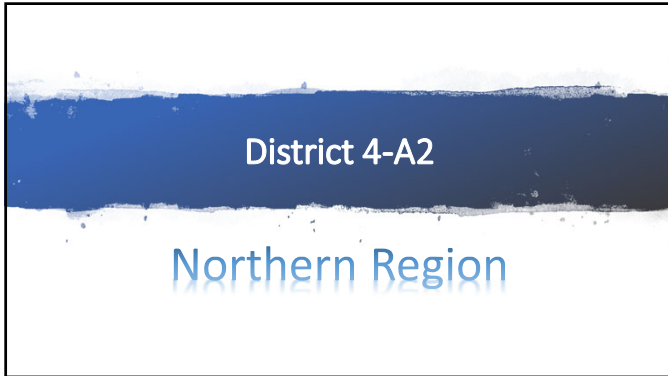

Lastly, here are a few dates to keep in mind:

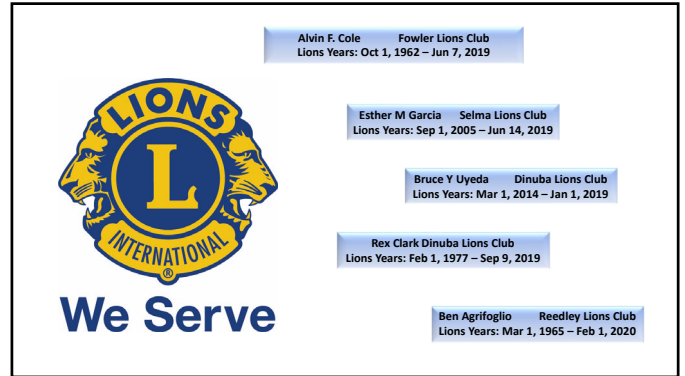

2nd Quarter Zone meeting will be in the first part of November



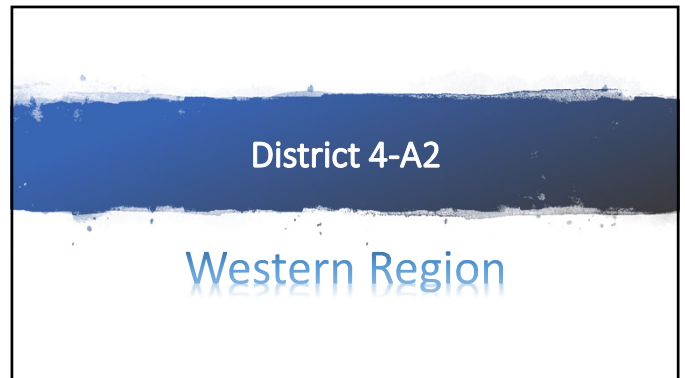

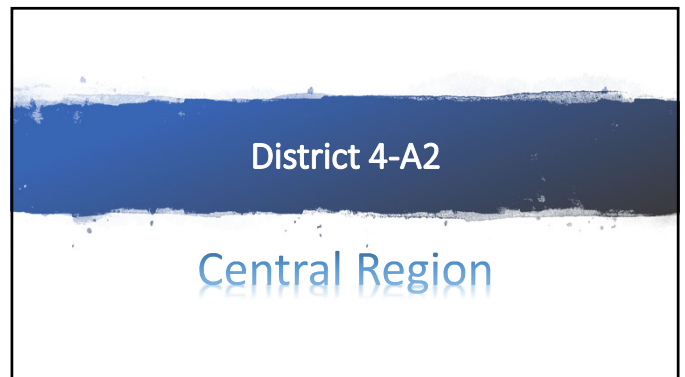
