-Bearskin Meadow – this is the balance of the grant funds – not all that was raised for this project.

-Creek Fire grant-this grant is closed out. We returned \$890.77 of unused funds to LCIF.

-We held a vote to pass the budget proposal for 2021-2022 Lion year. One modification was made to increase the LEF annual donation to \$1000. The budget advisory committee's motion was to recommend the proposed 2020-2021 district budget to our delegates at our 2021 District Convention. CS Lion Cheri Provancha seconded the motion. The budget passed with a vote of 17 aye and 0 nay. Budget will be included on the ballot at the convention.

-We had a motion from Bobbie Jo Mendez and a second from Lion Rose Rodriguez. "I move that the district transfer a budget amount of \$4,500 to the Student Speaker Contest for 1 scholarship for the winner of the district-level contest on the condition that the Lions 4th District Student Speakers Foundation cancels the contest before this level of the contest is held. If this condition is met, the money is to be transferred from unspent funds at the end of the current Lions year." Motion passed 17 aye, 0 nay

84th Annual Student Speaker Contest Report

Distance and Online Learning: Pros and Cons

The Student Speaker Contest weathered the 2020 pandemic successfully. The contests were all completed even if it wasn't in the traditional mode. I want to thank each of the chairs of the contest for their flexibility and dedication to the task of just "getting it done".

With that behind us, the contest is moving forward to the 2021 event. The Student Speaker Foundation and the Student Speaker Committee has spent lots of zoom time, mail and telephone calls to determine which way to move to implementing this year's contest. One definite agreement was it can't be held as it was in 2020.

Packets were completed and either handed out or mail to clubs, zone, region, district and area chairs. The Council of Governors agreed that the contest was important and wanted it to be held. Please read the booklet as it has a few major changes that need to be understood before the contest is held.

A disclaimer statement was added to be read after the Contest Rules were read and before reading the Causes for Disqualification on page 14 of the booklet. The statement reads: **"Due to restrictions of the COVID 19 Virus, the MD4 Student Speaker may be canceled at any time, thus ending the Lions Fourth District Student Speaker Foundation obligation for funding scholarships."**

Clubs and Local Districts are the funding agents for the club, zone and region contests. With that understanding the SS committee has agreed that the club, zone and region level can be held as a live or live zoom event, as long as all the contestants are present at the same place and at the same time. At this time the district, area and final contests are slated to held live. Another addition to the contest is a required Waive and Release of Liability that must be filled out by each student and signed by both the student and the parent/guardian. This form is available and will be sent out to all clubs, zones and region chairs.

As District 4-A2 Student Speaker Chair, I would like to recommend that in the event that the contest has to be cancelled, that District 4-A2 entertain the idea of funding the \$4,500.00 level. This gives the contest at least a guarantee to our students for club, zone, region and district scholarship money. In discussion with DG David, I would ask the cabinet hear a motion from Central Region Chair Bobbie Jo Mendez .

The sooner the treatment is given, the greater the chance it will work. The purpose of this treatment is to decrease the risk of developing severe disease and being admitted to the hospital. Callers will be screened and those who qualify will be offered a medical exam and treatment with intravenous antibodies. The treatment lasts about two hours and people who receive treatment will go home the same day.

What is a service dog?



A service dog is a dog that has been trained to perform tasks that assist with a person's disability.

Service dogs are protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and have rights and legal protection.

Service dogs may accompany their handler anywhere it is safe for them to go as long as they are under control and well behaved.

Service dogs can help with a variety of disabilities, from mobility issues to psychological distress.

Service dogs can be any breed, shape, or size.

What is California Service Dog Academy?

California Service Dog Academy (CSDA) is a non-profit that trains dogs to work in specialized settings.

Currently, CSDA is funded by a federal grant from the Wounded Warrior Service Dog Program. This grant allows us to provide veterans with service dogs free of charge. We also place Facility Dogs with First Responders to assist with work-related stress.

CSDA is dedicated to raising awareness, educating the public, and holding ourselves to the highest standards when it comes to our dogs and clients.

What can a service dog help with?

Symptom: PTSD flashback

Task: Recognize and interrupt flashbacks with a paw or nudge

Symptom: Trouble entering a dark room

Task: Go into the room and turn the lights on

Symptom: Unable to bend over

Task: Pick items up and hand them to you

Symptom: Fatigue/Moving slowly

Task: Pull forward/allow you to brace

Symptom: Unable to call for help

Task: Can call 911 or other emergency number on a dog phone

Symptom: Social anxiety/discomfort

Symptom: Unable to locate exit/confusion

Task: Able to find and guide to an exit

About CSDA

CSDA is a candidate program for Assistance Dogs International and adheres to a high standard of training for both dogs & handlers. CSDA is dedicated to using positive reinforcement training methods with our dogs.

Inspired by countless clients over the years who have had trouble finding a quality dog to assist them with their disabilities, California Service Dog Academy was founded in 2018 by Matthew & Rebecca Corso. As the owners of a dog training and behavior consulting company, Matt & Rebecca are used to helping dogs of all shapes and sizes with their training and behavior needs. When they began consulting with people interested in service dogs, it became clear that the demand for good dogs far outweighed the supply. As Matt & Rebecca advised individuals interested in "owner trained service dogs" they also assisted with all the aspects involved in the selection, evaluation and training of puppies and dogs for service work. The work with their clients and the so often long and heartbreaking journey to find a dog led them to create CSDA with the hope of providing appropriate dogs to those who truly need them.

Do I qualify for a service dog?

You must have a disability in order to qualify for a service dog. If you aren't sure if you have a disability, you should talk to your doctor or consult CSDA staff. We are happy to answer any questions, but any advice does not qualify as a substitute for actual medical advice.

Physical and mental impairments can qualify you for a service dog if the service dog is able to improve your quality of life by performing tasks.

For some disabilities, service dogs are not beneficial and may cause more harm (e.g. certain types of anxiety).

If you do not have a disability, you may benefit from another type of assistance animal.

Is a service dog right for me?

- **Stable Condition**
 - In order to take on a service dog, your condition needs to be stable, predictable, and manageable
- **Good record keeping habits**
 - Documentation of training is required for graduation
- **Strong work ethic and motivation**
 - Training a service dog can be difficult and requires a lot of time, effort, and patience
- **Ability to work on your own**
 - You will need to find time to work with your dog outside of scheduled training sessions with CSDA
- **Lifelong learner**
 - You will need to continually train and seek out new information while working with your dog
- **Ability to meet the social, mental, and physical needs of a service dog**
 - A service dog is still a dog. Your dog will need exercise, care, playtime, vet appointments, and more.
- **Have a realistic expectation of the lifestyle with a service dog including potential for failure**
 - Having a service dog is not always easy, and training is not always successful
- **Have a love and respect for animals**
 - Empathy and understanding will help you build a strong relationship with your service dog

Applying for a Service Dog with CSDA

Applying to be part of CSDA's Sentinel Dog program is easy!

The only requirements for this program are the following:

1. Applicant must be a Veteran
2. Applicant must have a disability of some kind (please ask us if you are not sure!)
3. Applicant can provide a DD-214
4. Applicant's Doctor can provide a note recommending a Service Dog
5. Applicant is willing to do some of the work!

Requirements of the Program

- **Required documents submitted**
 - DD-214
 - Doctor's Note
- **Meetings with CSDA's counselors**
 - This is supplemental only and to ensure our program is benefiting all participants
- **Attending or participating online in weekly classes**
 - 6 classes help prepare applicants to receive a dog
 - Applicants will not be able to receive a dog or begin training unless all classes are completed and therapy sessions are attended
- **Attending regular training sessions**
 - CSDA requires a minimum of 5 training sessions each month to be attended
 - A variety of training dates and times will be available as well as some private sessions if needed
 - Training sessions will be assigned based on availability to ensure small class sizes and social distancing
- **Training Logs Completed**
 - Training logs must be filled out for any dog attending training once per month minimum

Sentinel Dog Veteran Assistance Program



The Sentinel Dog program is for veterans ONLY

All requirements must be met prior to entry into the program.

Once in the program, CSDA conducts a 6-week handler course with the applicants that prepares them to receive and work with a dog.

After the 6-week course is complete, training sessions and dog matching begins.

If a client has their own dog, CSDA will evaluate it to determine if it would be a good service dog.

If being matched with a dog, Veterans work closely with CSDA trainers to get matched with the right dog.

Each dog is trained to fit the needs of the Veteran.

How It Works

1. Classes usually start in September. Online and in-person options are available
2. CSDA staff conducts home checks to ensure a safe environment for any dog that needs to be placed.
3. If a client already has a dog they would like to train to be a service dog, evaluations will be scheduled
4. If a client needs a dog from CSDA, a questionnaire will be sent out.
5. Appointments with CSDA counselors will be scheduled.
6. Once classes are complete, clients will be matched with a dog.
7. Training will begin.
8. Regular evaluations will be handed out, giving updates on where each client stands with our graduation requirements.
 1. AKC's Canine Good Citizen Test
 2. ADB Public Access Test
 3. 3 tasks to mitigate your disability

COVID-19 Adjustments

- CSDA takes the COVID-19 pandemic very seriously and closely follows all local, state, and federal guidelines and recommendations
- Group trainings have been cancelled
- One-on-one training sessions and virtual training sessions are now available
- PPE is worn by all staff and handed out to clients when needed
- Staff sanitizes before and after each client interaction
- 6-foot social distancing practice is followed
- Requirements to attend trainings have dropped to reduce necessary travel for clients and staff

How does the Facility Dog program work?

- CSDA currently only provides facility dogs to first responders
- CSDA provides the dog, the training, and support throughout the dog's working life
- CSDA will evaluate potential candidate dogs for Facility Dog work free of charge
- Dogs are placed and trained specifically for the facility where they will be working
- Each facility dog must have one assigned handler that does not change
- The facility where the dog will be working must support the program

Positive reinforcement is shown to be more effective at training dogs AND is a more therapeutic way to work with a dog.

CSDA is a candidate program for Assistance Dogs International (ADI), we use the same standards for our dogs that ADI uses.

Our trainings focus on our clients. CSDA tailors a training plan for each team and their goals to help ensure that they are getting all the help you need to succeed.

Trainers assist with finding tasks for each dog to learn that can help with that handler's specific disability so every CSDA service dog has all the tools it needs to do its job.
