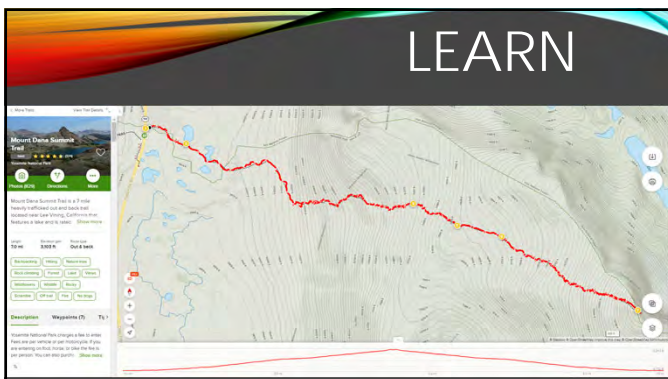

- 7) Announced CLF Wine Tasting for \$20 at the Council of Governors in Irvine on 08/06/2021 and auction of a selection of wines. At Reno in May \$6000 was raised and 2 \$20 Boards were filled up.
- 8) Next report at the 2nd District Meeting in Lemoore on October 29th and 30th.

Pull Tab Report

Last year we collected a total of **172.3** pounds of pull tabs. This was **349.17** pounds less than our highest collection year, 2018-2019 in which we collected **521.47** pounds for the Bakersfield Ronald McDonald house.

Canister sales – we have collected **\$215** in canister sales to date and a one-time district donation of **\$69** which was collected during our district convention part 2 in May. For a grand total of **\$289** which will be donated to the Central Valley Ronald McDonald House in Madera.

Cell Phone & Ink Cartridge Collection

The MD4 Student Speaker Foundation requests \$7000 from each district to cover the approximately 103 thousand dollars needed to conduct the event. For the year 2020-2021 our district collected 75 cell phone and 350 ink cartridges. This translated into approximately \$200 being credited to MD4-A2's obligation to the MD4 Student Speaker Program.

Kases for Kids

Kases for Kids continues to serve foster children of our District. Though base storage is now in Madera, District 4A1, the program continues to reach children via foster family agencies, Fresno/Madera CASA, and FBI Victim Services. With support of individuals, Minarets High School FFA, Teens That Care (Fresno), Central Sierra Enterprises, Master Storage 365 and North Fresno Lions Club, we work towards providing dignity to a child, one suitcase at a time.

IN THE MEDIUM CLUBS, THESE ARE CLUBS WITH 20 TO 34 AND YOU NEED 4 MEMBERS ATTENDING FOR IT TO BE AN OFFICIAL VISITATION, WE HAD TWO IN COMPETITION: CLOVIS COUNTRY WITH 366 POINTS AND VISALIA PRIDE WITH 336.5 POINTS.

Patriotism Chair Report

Bill Morland has been a member of Visalia Breakfast Lions since August 1996. Shortly after coming to Visalia to work for the Tulare County Administrator's Office, Bill asked a work colleague, who was a very active Lion, Georgia Souza, to take him to all the Lions Clubs in town and see if one of the clubs would conform to his demanding requirements. Before too long, Lion Bill found a home with Breakfast. Bill became President of Breakfast Lions in 2003-2004, and has been a Zone Chair for two different zones in District 4A-2.

Bill is currently Commander of American Legion Post 18, and is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, AMVETS, Avenue of Flags Memorial Day Association, and the Visalia Veterans Committee. He is a Navy veteran who served as an Aviation Electronics Technician on the aircraft carrier USS Ticonderoga during the Vietnam War. Bill is a retired government administrator who has been substitute teaching for the past 13 years in Tulare and Kings Counties schools. I have asked Bill to speak briefly today about areas and programs where Lions clubs in our district can work with veterans groups.

Good morning fellow Lions. Thank you Lion Governor David for inviting me to speak about ways that Lions and Lions clubs can work closely with veterans groups in their communities. I am most familiar with the veterans' groups in Visalia and Tulare County. Most of these groups, the American Legion, AMVETS and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, have posts in Kern, Kings and Fresno counties. It would not surprise me to learn that some of the Lions in this room are members of these groups.

As you probably know, many of the programs and activities that most people associate with local veteran's activities were canceled, postponed, or greatly scaled back during this Pandemic. The impact of the pandemic continues to be experienced in several important areas:

Central Valley Honor Flight – flying WWII and Korean Era veterans back to Washington DC for honors at the memorials dedicated to their service has been postponed until 2022.

Sunday Bingo Visits to the residents of the Nursing Facility at the Fresno VA Hospital – These have been suspended indefinitely.

Visiting veterans residing in local nursing, convalescent, and retirement homes. Every December, Visalia veterans' groups visit the convalescent homes with other volunteers, giving each veteran a gift and singing holiday songs to them. Most facilities here in Visalia no longer allow this to be done. We are not certain if we can do this again in the future.

However, there are still many opportunities to work with veterans on their projects, and help veterans relate to the service ethic exemplified in Lionism. 'We Serve' as Lions, and veterans have also served. You have on your tables the contacts.

Honor Flight is always looking to sign up volunteers to accompany the vets to be honored in Washington, DC. Nearly all the veterans are 75 to 95 years old. The flights and room accommodations cost money and donations are always appreciated. Bill Goodreau is our Central Valley Honor Flight Contact. Bill can be reached at 559-679-3961.

A Combat Veterans Hope in Visalia (ACVH) – Your contact is a Marine veteran, Carlos ‘CJ’ Cantu, who works at College of the Sequoia. CJ is looking for sponsors and players for ACVH’s annual Golf Tourney (Nov 13, Tulare Golf Course), and for their 8 K Run (Nov 6, Plaza Park, Visalia). Carlos is can be reached at 254-913-1354. ACVH also collaborates with ‘Mending Fences,’ assisting veterans with Post Traumatic Stress issues.

The Visalia Veterans Committee and their programs, including restoring the Greatest Generation Mural on Mooney Blvd. This committee also exchanges brand new American Flags for damaged and faded flags every June 14. The VFW annually holds two excellent youth programs, the Voice of Democracy script writing contest for high school students, and the Patriot Pen essay contest for students in 6th, 7th and 8th grades. VFW posts in Fresno, Madera, Kerman, Clovis, Visalia, Tulare and Kern County need judges for both contests. Lion Governor David Hamilton has been a judge for the Visalia VFW.

The American Legion Boys and Girls State program – this is where high school students learn about the practical issues of American governance, spending several days in Sacramento organizing simulated government structures and electing their leaders. Many Legion posts in Fresno, Kings and Kern Counties are looking for sponsors to help with the costs of transporting and housing the youth.

Lions Eye Foundation Eye Clinic Performance 2016-2020 has seen a steady yearly increase in surgeries, new patient referrals, intravitreal injections, laser and ophthalmic procedures. The notable exception is the decrease in 2020 due to Covid 19. Despite the 2020 decrease, the 2020 numbers, with the exception of new patient referrals, are still greater than 2016. A review of the numbers are informative.

The Center for Medical and Medicaid Services has sent the Pacific Vision Surgery Center an official Medicare certification letter. This means the PVSC will soon be able to bill for Medicare patients. (PVSC) Pacific Vision Surgery Center will now set up an electronic claims and payment system and should be capable of submitting accumulated claims within the next two weeks. This is good news for Lions Eye Foundation for it is hoped that in the long term part of the profits PVF generates will help cover some future Lions Eye Foundation patient surgeries. When Lions Eye Foundation granted \$1.5 million for the ASC development, PVF agreed to cover Lions Eye Foundation patient surgeries up to \$300,000 annually for 5 years.

Meals were provided by donations from several clubs. We had a very special sister team with Rosie and Rita cooking our meals. Thank you, ladies.

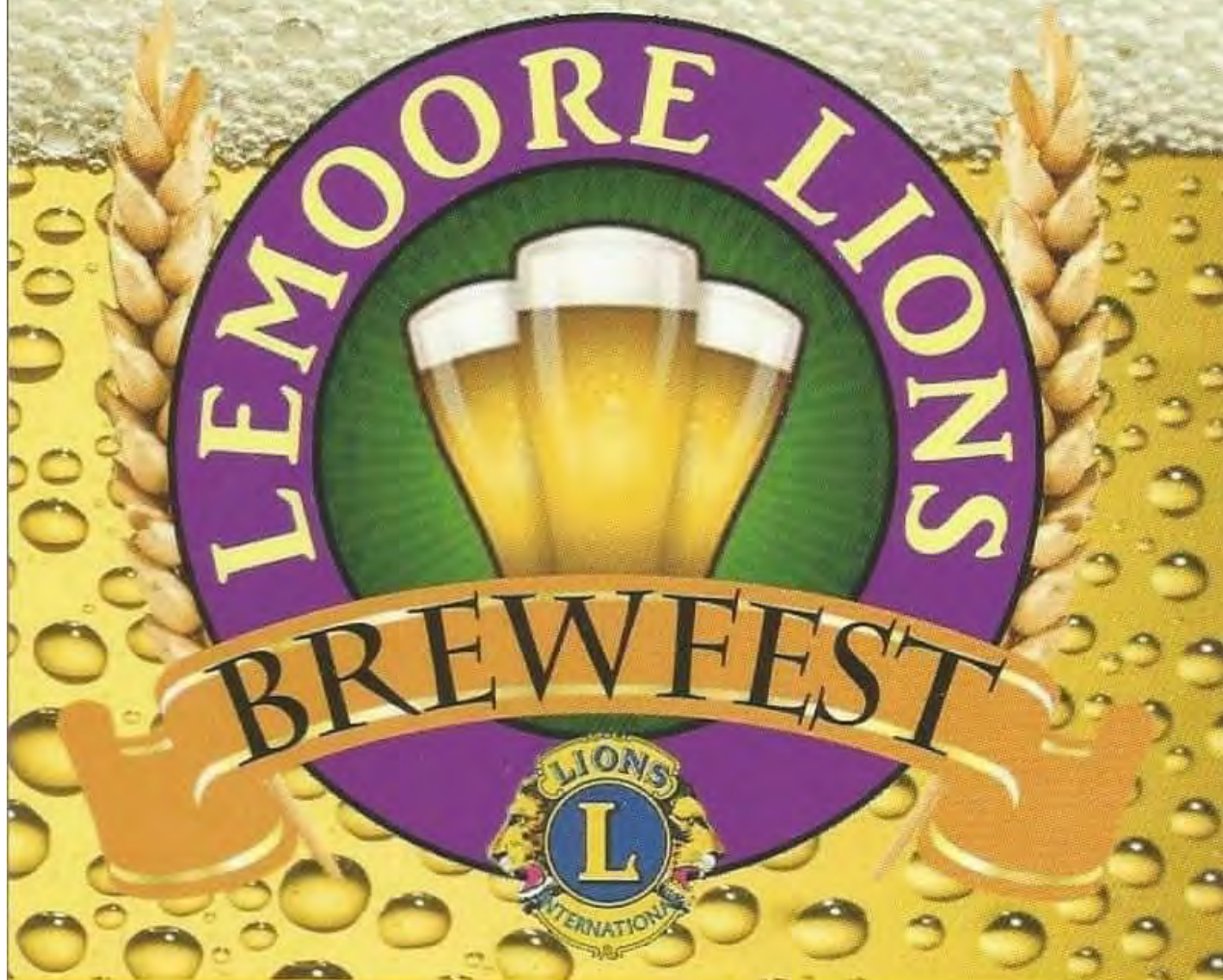

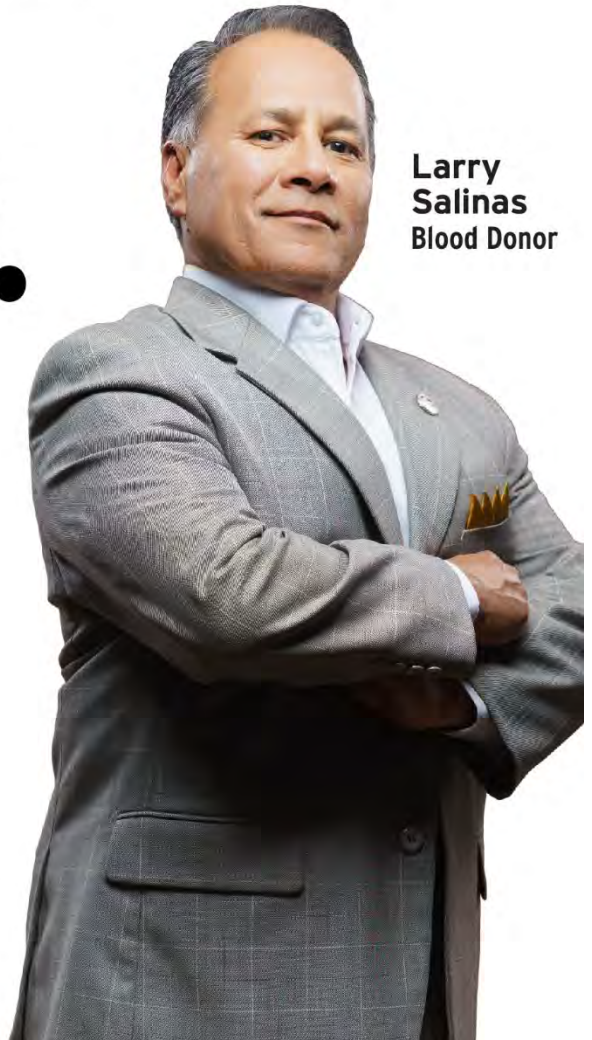

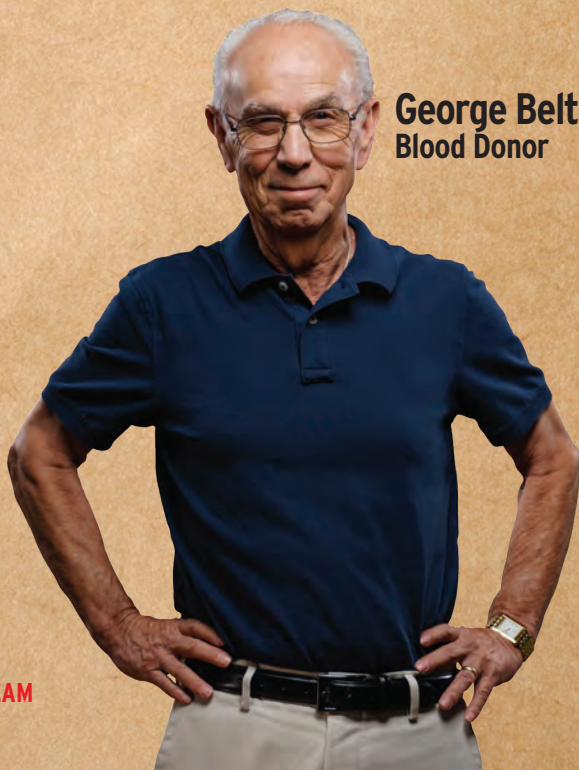

Blood donation takes less than one hour to complete. Donors must be in good general health, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and be at least 16 years of age (16 and 17-year-olds must have written parental consent). Senior citizens are encouraged to donate, as there is no upper age limit. Donors should eat a good meal and drink plenty of water within four hours prior to their donation. Donors can give blood every eight weeks. Photo ID is required at donor registration.

GETTING READY

Before You Donate

- Eat a healthy meal high in iron (tuna, spinach, quinoa, turkey).
- Drink plenty of water.
- Avoid highly caffeinated beverages (coffee, tea, soda, and energy drinks) as they can act as iron blockers.

After You Donate

- Drink plenty of water.
- Avoid strenuous physical activity.

WHAT TO EXPECT

1. Register

A photo ID is required to register, then you'll be asked to verify your name and address.

2. Mini-Physical and Interview

The mini-physical consists of checking your pulse, blood pressure, temperature and hemoglobin level. In the confidential interview, a trained interviewer will ask questions about your general health and medical history, as well as questions concerning risk behaviors, foreign travel and other subjects.

Your mini-physical and interview are conducted to ensure that giving blood is healthy for you and that your blood is as safe as possible for the recipient(s). All information gathered during the physical and interview is kept strictly confidential.

3. Whole Blood Donation

The collection of a unit, about one pint of blood takes about 15 minutes. You may feel a small pinch when the needle is inserted, but most donors do not feel any pain for the duration of the donation.

4. Relax

After your donation, you can enjoy refreshments to help replenish your fluids. At this time, you have the option of scheduling your next donation appointment. After you're done with relaxing and refreshments, you can resume most of your normal daily activities.

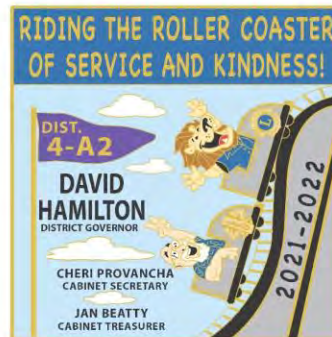
