

David in the Lion's Den

A 95-year Roller Coaster Ride

As most of you know by now, I was a trial attorney for many years. On the first day



It has been a 95-year roller coaster ride for the Bakersfield Host Lions!

When you are at the top of the roller coaster, looking down that long drop, you hang on until the end. You know there will be a good ending due to the engineering, design and planning that went into the structure.

During Bakersfield Host Lions 95 years, the engineering has been completed, the structure built, and when new technology & techniques became available, improved upon.

An odd hobby of mine is reading old newspapers. Below are just a VERY few things I learned about the Bakersfield Host Lions while combing through old newspapers. I will call the club as the newspapers did, "the Bakersfield Lions."

Lions Clubs International was founded on June 7, 1917, in Chicago. Nine years, 1 month, and 11 days later, the Bakersfield Lions sprang into existence on July 18, 1926.





The day the Bakersfield Lions chartered, Charlie Chaplin's comedy, "The Gold Rush" premiered at the Rex theatre in downtown Bakersfield.

The Bakersfield Lions got off on to a roaring start as the Bakersfield Morning Echo reported there was a LIVE Lion present at their charter party, held September 18, 1926, in the El Tejon Hotel. Soon after chartering, the club became enthusiastic supporters of Lions Club International, attending conventions.

The 16th Lions Club International Convention was held in Los Angeles, July 1932. The Bakersfield Californian reported that the Bakersfield Lions President William E. Patrick "will head a local delegation south on Sunday night." The grapevine at night in 1932? I'd call that "Brave as a Lion."

Lion J.C. Williams was selected as the club's delegate to the 1939 LCI convention in Pittsburg. The same Bakersfield Californian article reported on the club's program that week, "unsafe fireworks," apparently Kern County had fatal fire works accident previous years.

Lion President Les Boyton attended the 1940 LCI convention in Havana Cuba. The same article reported a club "steak bake in Jastro Park at 7:30 PM Thursday."

The Bakersfield Lions were also active at the district level as the Californian reported on February 6, 1954, the Bakersfield Lions were planning the District Convention to be held in April. It was further reported that the Bakersfield Lions "motored to Visalia Saturday to attend the fall meeting of the San Joaquin General Council of Lions."

During the International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, Helen Keller in 1925 charged Lions with becoming "Knights of the Blind in the crusade against darkness." In 1930 Lion George Bonham paints a cane white with a wide red band to aid the visually impaired after he witnesses a blind man having trouble crossing the street and in 1944; the world's first eye bank is created in New York City. Today, most eye banks are Lionssponsored.

The Bakersfield Lions have been involved in many projects while acting as "Knights of the blind, but they made the newspaper on April 22, 1950, with their gift of \$1000 to the Hazel Hurst school of the blind so that a local man, Homer Crawford could attend to learn new life skills, and how to work with his new guide dog, Lassie. The newspaper included a picture of Mr. Crawford and Hazel Hurst with their guide dogs. The manager of the school wrote a letter to the club, reporting the teams progress, and stated "it is wonderful to know that there are such wonderful service clubs as yours which take such an interest in the betterment of humanity."

In 1954 the LCI official motto was chosen: "We Serve." But the Bakersfield Lions already had embodied that motto with its 26 years of dedicated service to their city and surrounding community, the California Lions and across international borders.

In 1927 the club board of directors assisted in the movement to build a "new library building". Less than 3 months before Pearl Harbor the club honored the 153 aviation cadets of Lerdo Air Corps basic flying school with a "Tea Dance" and an "open house" at the

American Legion Hall for service men on leave. I'm sure many of those men were involved in the earliest days of World War II.

The Bakersfield Lions also spread the good works of LCI by starting new clubs. The California reported on March 20, 1941, that the Bakersfield Lions organized a new club in Wasco.

The Bakersfield Lions celebrated their 15th anniversary on July 9, 1941 with Lion President Roy Driggers presiding "at his first meeting."

In 1987 LCI amended its bylaws and invited women to become members. That didn't stop women from serving their community with the club way before that! On February 6, 1954, the "Ladies of the Lions Club of Bakersfield" gathered "to discuss plans for a district lions convention here in April."

The club held an interesting fund raiser in January 1977 when along with the other Bakersfield clubs and the Buttonwillow Lions, a concert was held by members of the Lawrence Welk Orchestra. The money raised benefitted the Braille Center and Special Olympics


GMT's Corner

Although all Lions clubs can work on these service areas all year long, MD-4 has designated certain months for a club competition. Report as you do normally, but also

send an email to <u>CALionsCare@gmail.com</u> to enter your club into the MD-4 competition for that month.

- **1. Blood Donations (Childhood Cancer):** start August 1st end August 31st, report number of pints.
- **2. Eye Glasses Collection (Vision):** start October 1st end October 31st, report number of glasses collected.
- **3. Food Collection (Hunger):** start December 1st end December 31st, report pounds of food, if monetary donations are given, one dollar equals one pound of food.
- **4. Environmental Enhancement Projects (Environment)**: starts April 1st ends April 30th, report number of hours volunteered.

District Disaster Relief Chair

District 4-A2 Lions stepped up in many, varied, and amazing ways to serve during the Kings National Park Complex (KNP) and the Windy Fires.

District 4-A2 Lions worked with the Red Cross, United Way, Family Health Care and Tulare County to assist fire fighters and evacuees. Many thanks to District Disaster Chair Lion Rob Andrade (also President of Clovis Country Lions).

1) KNP Complex Fire.

The fire crews camped and used the facilities at the Three Rivers Lions Roping Arena, plus the Lions fed 400 fire fighters for several days until Cal Fire could get services into place.

The Woodlake Lions processed all the evacuated animals, big and small at their Rodeo grounds on their way to the Tulare Agriculture Center. The Lions also stabled all the National Park mules and horses during the emergency.

Woodlake Lions arranged for meals for Red Cross volunteers through RunWay café of Woodlake for several days.

Exeter Breakfast Lions helped with housing fire fighters, along with Family Health Care, at the Comfort Inn in Three Rivers for a few days.

Exeter and Visalia Breakfast Clubs stood by for 7 days to prepare meals at the Woodlake community center for evacuees, but all evacuees found other housing and meals were not required.

Lion Robert Lee, Sequoia Lions, lined up the Visalia Emergency food Council to provide food for evacuees. Cabinet Secretary Lion Cheri Provancha located a possible source of food.

Evacuees, who do not qualify for Red Cross Shelter, yet have had to evacuated, scattered across Tulare County, were assisted by Hanford Breakfast and Three Rivers Lions Club on a club to family, personal basis. Many thanks to Lion Susan Boyd for her compassionate service the that family!

2) Windy Fire.

For approximately two weeks there up to 24 evacuees in the Red Cross Evacuation center, at Porterville College. The College provided breakfast and lunch Monday-Thursday, however, dinners each day and all meals on weekends were provided by the Exeter Breakfast Lions, McFarland Lions and Richgrove Lions. The McFarland Lions need extra thanks for the ways they stepped up and served the evacuees during this emergency. have stepped up to cover the rest of the meals for the evacuees.

Lion Jeannie Sa of Ponderosa Lions helped to evacuate small animals at Porterville College.

his clubs efforts with what the Red Cross needed. I've probably missed someone, I'm certain Three Rivers Lions performed other service even though some members were evacuated, or under evacuation warning. During one call to the Three Rivers President, she was busy preparing her goats for evacuation, so we didn't talk too long that time..

REMINDER!!!! All club tax Simple 990 forms must be submitted no later than **November 15, 2021** to the IRS and FTB. Per the tax code all tax forms must be filed no later than the 15th day of the 5th month after the end of the organizational accounting period. You can file for an extension, which will allow for filing no later than May 15, 2022. However, this extension must be filed no later than November 15, 2021. **The State FTB has asked MD4 for a list of club and tax ID numbers so they can confirm requirements.**



National Diabetes Month 2021 November 1 - November 29

- November is National Diabetes Month, an opportunity for local and regional advocates to team up and work with partners across the United States to raise awareness of the illness.
- The campaign hopes to raise awareness of symptoms, promote healthy living and ensure people are aware of risk factors.
- One in ten Americans have diabetes. Another 84 million are at risk of developing type 2 diabetes. However, there are small things that those at risk can do to minimize the risk of suffering with type 2.
- The national cost of diabetes to the US is \$245billion, and while for many this is a condition that is unavoidable, if more people acted upon medical advice and were aware of the risk factors, this cost could be reduced.

WORLD DIABETES DAY

World Diabetes Day (WDD) was created in 1991 by IDF and the World Health Organization in response to growing concerns about the escalating health threat posed by diabetes. World Diabetes Day became an official United Nations Day in 2006 with the passage of United Nation Resolution 61/225. It is marked every year on 14 November, the birthday of Sir Frederick Banting, who co-discovered insulin along with Charles Best in 1922.

WDD is the world's largest diabetes awareness campaign reaching a global audience of over 1 billion people in more than 160 countries. The campaign draws attention to issues of paramount importance to the diabetes world and keeps diabetes firmly in the public and political spotlight.

The World Diabetes Day campaign aims to be the:

- Platform to promote IDF advocacy efforts throughout the year.
- Global driver to promote the importance of taking coordinated and concerted actions to confront diabetes as a critical global health issue

The campaign is represented by a blue circle logo that was adopted in 2007 after the passage of the UN Resolution on diabetes. The blue circle is the



global symbol for diabetes awareness. It signifies the unity of the global diabetes community in response to the diabetes epidemic.

LCI lists concepts for why Lion and Leos should do environmental works:

- 1) Lions and Leos serve to strengthen the relationship between the community and its environment. We've seen how our stewardship of natural resources can improve quality of life and increase engagement in our local communities.
- 2) Sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of all communities.

Why a focus on the environment?

- 5+ years of drought conditions
- Our community wells run dry, are contaminated, or as in Lemoore, experience catastrophic failure
- 2 MAJOR and countless small fires last year and many burning this year
- A renewed realization of the impact of carbon emissions in a post pandemic environment. We have seen our footprint and need to find symbiosis for sustainability.
- Realize an increase in urban migration that impacts our communities.

BAGS 2 BENCHES

October 2021 - March 2022

This coming October I will be kicking off the Environmental Challenge, "BAGS 2 BENCHES". The basis of which is to collect 500lbs of plastic materials (see attached flyer for details) within a 6-month period. If we are successful, District 4-A2 Lions will receive a bench produced from the plastics that we collected. This project is being initiated in response to the March 2022 MD4 Environmental Challenge.

The Bags 2 Benches project is a coordinated effort with TREX corporation (the entity that is sponsoring the bench



challenge) https://recycle.trex.com/ and Sequoia Riverlands Trust (SRT) https://sequoiariverlands.org/ and more specifically, Kaweah Oaks Preserve to allow A2 Lions to place the bench(es) within the Preserve. This is huge! As you may know, most private and public facilities (parks, easements and such) follow a master plan that seldom allows for the type of composite bench that we are working toward.

I understand that this project may not be in your respective regions/towns per se. However, I would like to mention that Sequoia Riverlands Trust has holdings of 40,000-plus acres of nature preserves and other conservation lands in Tulare and Kings Counties. The Oaks Preserve is of particular interest as they have many trails that need adopting, projects that need hands on volunteers, some great public access facilities, and many opportunities to gain public knowledge of, and to publicize what Lions do.

Which bring me back full circle to the project at hand.

I NEED YOUR HELP! I NEED YOUR PLASTIC! We have already turned in over 100 lbs!

The official kickoff date and count down of 180 days, was October 1. With that, our 1st collection day was at

our 2nd Quarter District Meeting on Saturday, October 30th, 2021. I am coordinating with your Region Chairs to set up a pick-up location and dates in each of our district regions for the remainder of the challenge. My hope and goal are to expand Lion's relationship with Sequoia Riverlands Trust, to enhance MD4 A2 Lions public image, and to meet the MD4 environmental challenge. With all of your help, this project can be a win, win, win! Or for no other reason, this is a great way to help get these plastics out of our landfills throughout our district.

As per TREX guidelines, I will be reporting our poundage at the end of each month online, so all collections need to happen by the last week of the month. I will keep you all up to date on our poundage collected.

I have included several graphics for you to share with your clubs (if you choose to do so). A list of future pick-up dates and locations will be available at our 2nd quarter district meeting.



Why is this newsletter called West Coast racers?

As you know the motto for my governor year is "riding the rollercoaster of service and kindness".

West Coast Racers- A brand new roller coaster.

West Coast Racers is a dueling steel roller coaster located at Six Flags Magic Mountain theme park in Valencia, California. It is the world's first launch version of a racing roller coaster.

It would features four inversions – three zero-g rolls and one zero-g stall – along with 30 train interactions, which includes 14 track crossings and one "high-five" element across two laps around the course, where riders on opposing trains can also high 5 each other. The coaster reaches a maximum speed of 55 mph (89 km/h) and features a number of airtime hills and overbanked turns that will occur side-by-side.

It seemed fitting to name the newsletter after the West Coast Racers, a brand new roller coaster because like the Lions Club International, the idea of a roller coaster is over 104 years old, yet new and improved structures and engineering are constantly being introduced to improve the rides and outcomes for both Lions Clubs and roller coaster. Oldest Roller Coasters

On June 16, 1884, the first roller coaster in America opens at Coney Island, in Brooklyn, New York, called the switchback railway, it was the brainchild of LaMarcus Thompson and was one of the earliest designed for amusement in the United States. And the design was based partly on the Mauch Chunk Switchback Railway which was a coal-mining train that had started carrying passengers as a thrill ride in 1827.[5]

For five cents, riders would climb a tower to board the large bench-like car and were pushed off to coast 600 ft (183 m) down the track to another tower. The car went just over 6 mph (9.7 km/h). At the top of the other tower the vehicle was switched to a return track or "switched back" (hence the name).

This track design was soon replaced with an oval complete-circuit ride called the Serpentine Railway. In 1885 a lift system appeared in the ride called Gravity Pleasure. The Gravity Pleasure also featured cars in which the passengers could face forward instead of in the awkward bench-like seats of the first two roller coasters. The next year, coasters were designed that included dark tunnels with painted scenery.

ABOUT THE COMPANY

Moose's Meals was founded in March of 2020 in Visalia, California, by Sarah Vinet and Matt Vinet, partly in response to COVID-19 but mostly in response to the torrent of animals in their community being abandoned, neglected or surrendered. Most often, these circumstances arise through no fault of the owner, or because owners are not educated about spaying and neutering, microchipping, and responsible pet ownership. This results in overflowing shelters and rescues in the Tulare County area and the facilities just can't keep up.

Moose's Meals distributes food once per month on a first-come first-serve basis. Food recipients have to fill out an application and provide proof of need such as an EBT card, Medicaid card, Medicare card, Veteran ID, proof of Social Security benefits, WIC card, Section 8 paperwork or unemployment award letters. Moose's Meals provides food for up to 4 pets per household, which aligns with Visalia City

Ordinance which allows no more than 4 pets per household. Moose's Meals provides food for the pets a recipient has when they first sign up. Moose's Meals does not provide food for pets added after the recipient has signed up for the program, or shelters or rescues.





Introduction to November George Washington Puzzle

The battle of Brooklyn (or sometimes called battle of Long Island). happened just 1 month and 17 days after the declaration of Independence. It was the first major battle to take place after the United States declared its independence on July 4, 1776 and judged by troop deployment and combat, it was the biggest battle of the revolutionary war.

There was a song in the Broadway play Hamilton called "Right Hand Man". The song introduces George Washington and discusses the battle of Long Island sometimes called the battle of Brooklyn.

The song begins "British admiral Howe has troops on the water, 32000 troops in New York harbor".

The battle did not go well for the Americans. Due to some miscommunication with the younger officers, the colonial troops were in disarray and lost 20% of their contingent. They were on the verge of total defeat when bad weather came in.

. On the night of August 29–30, using the fog and bad weather Washington evacuated the entire Continental Army to Manhattan without further loss of supplies or a single life. Washington was the last soldier to step off the last boat.


Although the British gained access to the strategically important Port of New York, which they held for the rest of the war, Washington's retreat enabled the Continental Army to regroup and fight another day. And we know how THAT story ended.

So, metaphorically, that's where District 4-A2 is today, we are regrouped and ready to continue our service to the community.

Yes, Covid-19 was our fog and rain, but under the leadership of IPPDG (Immediate Past Pandemic District Governor) David Beeman, District 4-A2 continued service, activities, and fundraising projects. 


