According to the Pennsylvania Sentinel in 1785, the revolutionary war had removed that "great reluctance to innovation, so remarkable in old communities"

I have often discussed the American Revolutionary War during my club visits and district meetings to encourage innovation in the face of the difficult times we find ourselves in.

By now you are familiar with of the Battle of Brooklyn where General George Washington was surrounded on three sides by General Howe and blocked by New York's East River. During the battle a storm came in and George Washington used the storm and innovated a solution to safely evacuate all his troops and supplies to Manhattan



Island where the Patriots retreated and eventually win the Revolution.

During the American Revolution, 90 percent of deaths were caused by disease, not by battle or bullets. The smallpox virus was the most vicious of them all. Although his order was controversial, General Washington was able to inoculate the entire Continental Army during the winter of 1777=1778. Death due to smallpox in the Army dropped to about 19%.

Historians credit Washington's innovations at the Battle of Brooklyn and his medical actions with being the two main factors allowing the Colonials to prevail.

The third factor in winning the American Revolution, as with most wars, was women's innovations.

When the Revolution broke out the Colonies were cut off from many essential imports. Not only did women step up to produce hundreds of thousands of yards of home spun cloth for uniforms, supervise the production of agriculture or work in the fields to feed the troops, many women went into the battlefield to maintain camp and be nurses. Many women also fought in battle.

One of those women was Molly Pitcher," the nickname given to Mary Ludwig Hays McCauley. During the Battle of Monmouth Court House, New Jersey, on June 28, 1778. Molly delivered water with pitchers to her husband's battery to cool the cannons and the soldiers. When Molly's husband was wounded or collapsed, "Molly" took her husband's place as a member of the gun crew for the remainder of the battle. The troops called her "Captain Molly."

Although not allowed to be regular Lions, women have always been essential in our District 4-A2, whether it be as a Lioness or the [your town name here] Lady Lions. That all changed at the Lions International convention held in Taipei in 1987. Less than eight months later, the Visalia Charter Oak Lions were chartered with over 50 women. Four months after that, Lion Carrie Diltz, Charter Oak Lions, became the first woman region chair in 4-A2. In 1996 Dana (Papagni) Biggs (Clovis Lions-now North Fresno) was elected first woman governor of 4-A2, and was elected Lion Club International Director in 2007.

At its 65th Annual Convention last weekend, District 4A-2 elected its first all-woman Governor team.:

1st VDG Lion Falguni Patel as incoming Governor.

2nd VDG Lion Christy Kroell as incoming 1st VDG.

Cabinet Secretary Lion COL Cheri Provancha as incoming 2nd VDG.

I am proud to go down in history as the first 4-A2 District Governor to pass the leadership of this roller coaster, known as District 4-A2, to a team of strong, intelligent and super-capable women who will "open the door to new possibilities"





District 4-A2 Convention Pin Explained

There was so much to talk about at the convention, I forgot to tell you about the design of the convention pin. As you can see from the picture, it continues the roller coaster theme, but this time the track is level, showing that for the convention we were taking a



break from the ride and celebrating. If you connect the pins from new member night to the convention it is a continuous ride.

The house on the pin is the Captain Cass House which is still in downtown Cayucos,

Prehistorically the local area was inhabited by the Chumash people, who settled the coastal San Luis Obispo area approximately 10,000 to 11,000 BC, including a large village to the South of Cayucos at Morro Creek.

Captain James Cass left his New England home, sailed around the Horn and settled in Cayucos in 1867 on 320 acres of the original Rancho Moro Y Cayucos Spanish Land Grant of 8,845 acres. He realized the future possibilities of the excellent location as a shipping port of cheese, hides, beef and fresh water. He and his partner, Captain Ingals, built the pier, a store and a warehouse. It was known as Cass' Landing. Captain Cass's home still stands at the north end of town.

C.H. Phillips, well known real estate promoter, subdivided another section of the land grant into town lots and Cayucos was born. The surrounding land and rich soil was perfect for fruit, dairying, berries, farming, alfalfa and beans. Cayucos prospered, also buoyed by fruitful harvests of fish and abalone, around Cass' landing.

The land grant was subdivided into town lots and Cayucos was born.

Cayucos took its name from the original rancho land grant which means kayak or canoe; a small fishing boat such as used by the Aleuts in hunting sea otters along the coast.

The pier still exists, and the warehouse has become a community center and until recently, was the meeting place for the Cayucos Lions

POW - MIA Remembrance Table At District Meetings

The Viet Nam war officially ended on April 30, 1975. Those of us who are of the "Viet Nam Era" and other veterans, have an awareness of remembering Prisoners of War and the Missing in Action, that much of the general public no longer has.

To bring the POW/MIA back into focus, as District Governor, I had a POW-MIA Remembrance Table set up in the main meeting hall or dining area of each district meeting, including the Morro Bay convention held last week. All the items listed below were displayed, with the following written description framed and on the table.

POW - MIA Remembrance Table



This table is our way of symbolizing the fact that members of our United States Military are missing from our midst. They are commonly called POWs or MIAs, we call them "Brothers & Sisters." They are unable to be with us this evening and so we remember them.

This Table set for one is small-symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his oppressors. Remember!

The Tablecloth is white - Symbolizing the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms.

Remember!

The single Red Rose - reminds us of the families and loved ones of our comrades-in-arms who keep the faith awaiting their return. Remember!

The Red Ribbon on the vase- is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn upon the lapel and breasts of thousands who bear witness to their unyielding determination to demand a proper accounting of our missing. Remember!

The Candle is lit - Symbolizing the upward reach of their unconquerable spirit. Remember!

A slice ice of Lemon on the bread plate -to remind us of their bitter fate. Remember!

There is Salt upon the bread plate - Symbolic of the family's tears as they wait. Remember!

The Glass is inverted - They cannot toast with us this night. Remember!

The Chair - The chair is empty. They are not here. Remember!
Until the day they come home, Remember!

Celebrating 65 years of District 4-A2 History

- Multiple District Four had its beginning in Oakland with the organization on **February 27, 1917**, of the first Lions Club on the west coast, the first president of the club was Jesse Robinson, who became president of Lions Clubs International in 1919.
- In 1921 the First District was divided the new District 4 consisted of California, Nevada and Hawaii. In 1924 Nevada had three Lions Clubs. The first "Deputy District Governor" was appointed to lead Lions Clubs in Nevada.
- In 1939 the delegates at International Convention, in Long Beach, voted to adopt the song "God Bless America" as the official song of the Lions of California and Nevada.
- On July 1, 1957, Multiple District Four was divided into 12 districts and the Council of Governors chose to redesignate the districts in the north, the "C" districts, the middle, the "A" districts and the southern districts the "L" districts, an abbreviation State of California CAL. Nevada remained as the "N" district.
- July 1, 1957, Nick C. Daley (South Fresno) became the first district Governor of District 4-A2.
- 1959- James A Hopper (North Fresno) elected MD-4 Council Chair.
- 1963- Annual visitation/service project to Ensenada begins.
- **1971-** Nelson C. Gray (East Fresno Lions) elected MD-4 Council Chair.
- 1975- Harry J. Aslan of Kingsburg became International President.
- 1987- Women join District 4-A2 en masse when Charter Oaks Lions charters with over 50 members
- 1988- Lion Carrie Diltz (Charter Oak Lions), first woman Region Chair in 4-A2.
- 1990-1991 William Bill Biggs (now life member of North Fresno Lions) became International President.

- **1994-** John R. Parker (Visalia Host Lions) elected MD-4 Council Chair.
- 1996 -Dana (Papagni) Biggs (Clovis Lions-now North Fresno) elected first woman governor of 4-A2.
- **July 2002** Kay K. Fukushima of Sacramento was elected International President of LCI. the seventh MD-4 Lion to be President.
- **July 5, 2006**, District 4-N (Nevada) officially separated from Multiple District 4 and became District 46.
- **2007** Dana Biggs elected International Director.
- 2022- District 4A-2 elect an all-woman Governor team. 1st VDG Lion Falguni Patel as incoming Governor, 2nd VDG Lion Christy Kroell as incoming 1st VDG and Cabinet Secretary Lion COL Cheri Provancha as incoming 2nd VDG



MD4 Student Speaker Contest 2022



We are approaching the end of another Lion's year, with about a month to go. I want to thank all the clubs and individual Lions who have made donations to LCIF this year. Through the end of March 2022, our District has given \$27,292. That doesn't include donations given in April. If anyone wants to make a donation that would count for this Lion's year, please try to make it by June 15th to give the staff at LCIF time to get it processed and recorded.

We had a great Melvin Jones Fellowship Lunch at our District Convention in April. Our Keynote Speaker was Past International Director Jack Epperson. Some Melvin Jones Fellowships and/or Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships were presented.

Two of our clubs, if not already there, are close to becoming Model Clubs. They have until June of 2023 to finish their pledges. This counts donations to LCIF since July 1, 2017.




