June 20: Marjaree Mason Center receives \$1500 Donation from NFL

Celia Malagon and Jessica Saylor gave a very informative talk and slide show about domestic violence and services the Marjaree Mason Center offers. Lion Phil secured the speakers, but we had a surprise member introduce them.

PDG and PID Dana Biggs and PIP Bill Biggs attended and announced they had moved back to Fresno to be near family. Lion Dana remembered the Marjaree Mason Center's origins and gave a little history as she introduced our two speakers.



Celia and Jessica alternated presenting an informative slide show about domestic violence and its impact on survivors, children, and friends. The basic mission of the Marjaree Mason Center is to support and empower adults and children affected by domestic violence. It is named after Marjaree Mason who was killed by her abusive ex, who also was a police officer. The important work is done to honor victims and try to insure it never happens again. The definition of domestic violence is a pattern of abusive behavior for one partner to gain or maintain power and control over their intimate partner.

They stated that 1 in 3 women, 1 in 4 men and 1 in 3 teenagers report having experienced domestic violence. They believe this is under-reported. They outlined the types of abuse - physical, emotional, economic, sexual, psychological, spiritual, cultural and technology or stalking. The pattern is to isolate the victims and make them feel unworthy and unwanted through systematic abuse. An example of economic abuse is for the abuser to run up debt (that is in victim's name) and not pay, so victim ends up with bad credit and can't escape. They isolate them from friends and family so they have no one to turn to for help.

The Marjaree Mason Center estimates it takes 7 or 8 attempts to leave the situation before they are successful. Their advice to someone close to a victim - stay their friend, keep reaching out and being available, continue to advocate for them to leave and be ready to help when they are ready. Tech stalkers may stalk via phone or car location trackers or slip one into the victim's purse. Spiritual abuse is misusing scripture to justify the abuse. Cultural abuse involves not allowing them to speak in their native language which shames them and isolates them from friends and family. The abuse always follows a cycle or pattern, first the honeymoon phase (professions of love and kindness), tension building (shaming, blaming various types of abuse) followed by an acute explosion of anger or physical harm. At the center of the cycle of abuse is always denial - I'm sorry, I'll change, things will be better, it won't happen again.

Why is it so hard to leave? They actually love the abuser; it is the same as their birth family, so they think it's normal to have isolation, fear, low self esteem, self

blame, promises of contrition and change. They may also hold a traditional value system where the man is the absolute head, or they have children and have no place to go.



The Center helps them, encourages them to make a safety plan, have a bag packed, a safe place lined up in advance, and avenues of escape inside the house. Never hole up in a bathroom with no escape, for example. They are encouraged to take pictures and document the abuse. Never wear long scarfs or dangly jewelry that can be grabbed and used to choke. Create a plausible reason to leave the house to buy time. Do call 911. Do develop signals with the neighbors or friends. When they tell their story to the police, they are told to get the name and badge number.

Most domestic violence starts before age 25. It is by far more common for men to be the abusers and women the victims. Fresno County has the largest (63% higher) domestic violence rate in the state. There were more than 7,000 calls to police last year in Fresno. Marjaree Mason Center provides a 24/7 crisis hotline, counseling, legal advocacy, education and training (including in high schools and middle schools), children's advocacy and children's enrichment center. They can house 40 families in their safe houses for up to 30 days and will provide emergency shelter for all women and children in need.

At the close of the meeting, Lion President Ralph and PID Dana presented Celia and Jessica with a \$1500 check to continue their excellent work.
