On Friday, January 13, 2023, Lions of District 4-A2 hosted a blindfolded dinner to celebrate the 144th anniversary of the birth of Melvin Jones.

Approximately 130 Lions, friends and supporters gathered for the event. Food was prepared and served by Classic Catering at Six Two Five in Clovis California.

We welcomed special guests Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Trustee Past International Director Jenny Ware, Past Council Chair Roger Powell, District Governor Falguni Patel, Valley Center for the Blind (VCB) presenters, and members of local Kiwanis and Rotary clubs.

Lions were well represented with members from more than twenty clubs throughout California.

PCC Roger Powell presented the LCIF Chairman's award to PDG David Hamilton and PDG Vicki Beeman for their leadership in increased contributions to LCIF during Lions year 2021-2022.

In addition to raising awareness of the challenges faced by those with visual impairment, fundraising was a key goal of this event. Opportunity drawings and a silent auction were conducted. Net proceeds from the event exceeded \$12,000.

Additionally, a collection was taken up for the Valley Center for the Blind and in short order, \$600 was collected.

Entertainment was provided by DJ Laton Lion Dan Barcellos. After dinner the dancing continued for several hours.

A complimentary wine bar was staffed by Laton Lion Virginia Madden.

Before dinner was served, VCB talked about the challenges faced by visually impaired individuals. This was done in preparation for everyone to don their masks and proceed with their blindfolded dining experience. Dinner was a success with just a few making a minimal mess. We noticed individuals with forkfuls of nothing, some with forks so full it was hard to get everything in their mouth. Others very carefully used their hand to ensure food was deposited on their fork. Napkins were certainly in full use that evening. One thing that was not spilled happened to be their glasses of wine.

Special thanks to Zone Chairs Anna Herrera, Kaden Ferretti, Kerry Holguin and Robert Andrade, Region Chair Tony Reyes Jr, and committee chair PDG Tony F Reyes for a very successful event.

# New Youth Protection Law Passed in September 2021.

California Lions Respond in 2022

Attorneys Gerg Love and Kimberly Norris assert that, "The legislative history of Assembly Bill 506 makes it clear that lawmakers in California do not want a repeat of the sexual abuse crises facing Boy Scouts of America. "The new law is aimed at 'Youth Service Organizations' and outlines requirements related to training, background checks and policies.

California Lions had already adopted a Youth Protection Policy that applies to all clubs statewide. It is superseded in some parts by the new state law.

Lions will keep their framework of having a Youth Protection Officer in each district, who will help clubs manage the process of certifying Lions to work with youth. Each club is also required to do two things. One is to annually send the District Youth Protection Officer a signed copy of the standard statement that Yes we will, or No we won't have activities with youth this year.

The other requirement for *all* clubs, Yes or No, is to appoint a club Youth Protection Officer.

For clubs with no youth activities planned, it helps the club remember to send in the required letter, and helps the club remember who to ask if details of the Policy are suddenly needed during the year.

The other information all clubs need is to know who must be certified as a California Lions Youth Worker. This has also changed under the law from AB 506. It now defines a "Regular volunteer" as a volunteer with the youth service organization **who is** 18 years of age or older **and** who has direct contact with, or supervision of, children for more than 16 hours per month or 32 hours per year.

There is, of course, much more to the policy, but if clubs maintain the two steps of (a) sending in the annual letter/form, and (b) appointing a club Youth Protection Officer, they will be in good shape. Expect your club's Youth Protection Officer to have the definition of Regular Volunteer (above) handy and to know what to do if certifications are needed.

For more answers, one option is to ask our current District 4-A2Youth Protection Officer William Muñoz of the Kings Lions Club to speak to your club.





Is the Food Fair the best part of the District Convention?

Each year the Convention kicks off Friday night with an International Food fair. The event really sets the tone for the weekend, and usually includes food, drink, desserts, decorations, and sometimes games, costumes, dancing and competitions of various kinds.

This reporter sat down with Food Fair organizer and Convention Chair PDG Chiragkumar 'Kevin' Patel for a Q & A:

Q: Can you do something to help a club that wants to have a really good Food Fair booth, but several of their members can't stay for the whole convention?

A: Yes. This year we will have wristbands for everybody registered for the convention, to let them in to the Food Fair. But we will also have special wristbands for those who are only attending the Food Fair. Instead of the full Registration fee of \$30, these will cost only \$10. (Please note both prices go up after April 15th.)

Q: I heard the Food Fair awards are doubling this year. What's that about?

A: We will again recognize Best Booth, Best Food and Best Spirit for our Lions clubs, but this year we will also have the same awards to present for food booths our LEO Clubs enter.

Q: What's the theme for this year's Food Fair?

A: Foods of all Genres.

Q: If I haven't gone to the Food Fair before, why should I go this year?

A: Not only for the sights and sounds, the tastes and aromas, the fellowship of your extended Lions family, but this year the event is very close, right in the middle of our district. That means two things. Not only is this a convenient location for *you to attend*, but it means that some special dishes that don't travel well over long distances can make their appearance **only** here and now. We <u>also</u> expect more clubs to enter because it is easier when nearby. More booths, more food and more varieties.

# **DUES PROCESS CHANGED**

# MESSAGE FROM MD-4 Council Chair

Greetings Everyone,

There has been a change in collection and processing of Multiple District Four dues.

Hopefully this email and letter (attached) will put it all to rest.

This was voted on by the Council of Governors and will be in full effect on July 1, 2023. Some Districts have already started this process and it is working well.

The reason for the change was that having each club send not only the MD4 dues but also the District dues to the MD4 office was creating a bookkeeping nightmare that was not working very well. It was a process that caused delays in getting the correct funds sent back to the Districts and simply did not make sense as to why the districts had to send their dues away just to receive them back.

The new process keeps the District funds in the District and allows them to be used right away as the District see fit.

The process to follow is:

- The Council Treasurer and/or MD4 Bookkeeper will bill the District Treasurer the amount of \$9.00 per member for the Districts MD 4 dues every six menths.
- In turn the District Treasurer will bill each club for the District and Multiple District Four dues.
- Each Club will collect and then send the District and MD4 dues amount to the District Treasurer.
- Then the District Treasurer will send the collected MD4 dues to the MD4 Office for processing by the MD4 Bookkeeper.
- 5) Periodically, if the dues are not received then the clubs will be reminded of the balance due by their District Treasurer. Clubs that do not pay their dues will be placed in Status Quo and be recorded as not in good standing. All delegates of clubs not in good standing 15 days before the Multiple District Four Convention will not be allowed to vote on the ballot items.

#### California Lions Foundation (CLF)

### Report to the MD4 Council of Governors, February 23, 2023

Chartered in 2016, the California Lions Foundation is now an integral and impacting state-wide force in describing and demonstrating who we are, what we do, and why we are an MD4 California Lions association.

Membership is composed of the current 3 standing governors and vice district governors from each district of the Council of Governors of Multiple District Four (45 total members). Each district governor appoints a CLF board member representing their district (15 total board members). The CLF board is charged with setting the policy and procedures and conducting the operations of the Foundation. The board reports to the Council of Governors.

The purpose of CLF as a tax exempt 501c (3) corporation is to provide designated and matching financial grants to California Lions Clubs and districts to enable our Lions to deliver greater service to our local California communities. CLF augments and complements the grant allowance aspect of the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

Donations arrive to CLF each month from individuals, corporations, and Lions clubs. Received funds are carefully managed by CLF board members for distribution as grants to requesting California Lions clubs.

**Grants Distribution.** For the past 14 months the California Lions Foundation haas distributed almost 2 financial grants per week. All 15 of our districts have received multiple grants.

Donations arrive to CLF each month from individuals, corporations, and Lions clubs. Received funds are carefully managed by CLF board members for distribution as grants to requesting California Lions clubs.

During the 3-month timeframe from November 1, 2022 through January 31, 2023, a total of 18 grants were distributed, averaging over \$2700 each.

Diabetes Grant Program: 8 grants were distributed totaling \$7621.

Matching Grants: 7 grants were distributed totaling \$38,291.

Disaster Grants: 3 flood related grants to two districts were distributed totaling \$13,000.

<u>Summary</u>: Funds distributed during this 3-month timeframe total \$58,913 enabling our California Lions Clubs to better serve the needy in their local communities. Donations received during this 3-month timeframe total approximately \$25,000. A total of \$430,000 is in our bank account.

Bottom line, if the California Lions Foundation is to continue at the current pace to meet the financial assistance community service requests of our Lions Clubs, donations to CLF need to increase.

#### Effective March 01, 2023 -

- 1. CLF focus is to increase net proceeds by \$75,000.
- 2. New CLF grant program: "Lions & Leos and the Fight Against Hunger." This special program extends from March through May 2023. Rules: Up to \$2000 in grants per District, no more than one grant per club; Must involve a hands-on community service project with Lions and Leos working together to fight against hunger in our local California communities.
- The maximum Matching Grant is reduced from \$7500 to \$5000 until our net proceeds achieve the \$75,000 targeted net increase in corpus funds.

7/15/23-7/24/23: Target Conversion Date

Before 6/15/23: Enter all club officers for 2023-2024

**Before 6/15/23:** Enter service activity for events prior to 6/1/23. Reporting for 6/1/23 going forward will be in the new system after conversion

Before 6/15/23: Record any club or donations to LCIF are in the bank with the appropriate supporting documentation for recognition.

Before 6/15/23: Make sure club data is accurate for this year (2022-2023). For Example, new members, sponsors, new clubs formed, transfers and other end of year activities specific to clubs are correct and recorded in MyLion/MyLCI

- Make sure every member has an email listed and no shared emails can be used in the new LIONS PORTAL
- Make sure member birthdays are entered since birth dates in MyLCI will be converted even the old conversion 1/1/1900 date! Hint: in MyLCI under reports run "Member Information Update Report" and have your members update their info!
- Training is slated to begin in late April 2023 Stay tuned!

While "every member" is the optimum result, you can still be a Lion without e-mail. But, hey - get a free e-mail account!


