Food Fair Results!

As usual, the International Food Fair at the District Convention was a noisy event, with activities, music and 210 registered Lions and guests meeting new and old friends. That means you may not have caught the results from this year's Food Fair.

Our judges this year included the District Governor of District 4-C4 (San Francisco) and District 50 (Hawaii), and their spouses/partners-in-service. They also included our visiting International Director from Basehor, Kansas, Lion Deb Weaverling and her husband/partner-inservice, Lion Ron Weaverling, and 4-C4 1st Vice-Governor Kevin Guess and spouse, and 4-L3 2nd Vice-Governor Jennifer Cho. But none from our district.

They were faced with twelve competitive booths, mostly geared up for celebrating Cinco de Mayo. The other three booths included a "judges lounge," a district hospitality booth, and a district history display booth.





DISTRICT GOVERNOR NAMES TOP PROJECTS OF THE 2022-2023 YEAR

At the District Convention in Visalia the "Type 1 Diabetes Network" project, by the Rosedale Highway Lions Club, was named the Project of the Year *by a small club*.

The club ran a commercial, recorded by the diabetic son of a Lions member, on TV, radio, and social media. It invited families of kids with Type 1 diabetes to the Bakersfield eSports Center to network with other diabetic families, share their personal stories, and learn more about the latest insulin pumps, testing for families, and the new advances in research for a cure. The vendors shared valuable information speaking directly to families and the overall group. 85 people served and 30 volunteers at the event.

The Lions organized activities for kids so parents were able to get information from the vendors and JDRF.



Humanitarian of the Year - Tricia Stone-Shumaker of ACCESS Speech Pathology in Hanford.

ACCESS Speech is a woman-owned speech therapy clinic located in Hanford. The private practice employs 15 team members and was founded in 2017. They actively serve the needs of our local community by providing clinical speech, language and feeding assessment and Owner, Tricia Stone-Shumaker, is a speech pathologist focusing her practice on the early intervention and autism populations. therapy services to children of all ages. They also give back to non-profits and organizations in need every year. She owns a cross-beaked rooster named Poppy who has travelled cross country and is hand fed.

Tricia is also the author of the Poppy's Adventures children's book series. The series follows a special needs chicken named Poppy. The first book recently won the Moon Beam Children's Book Silver Award for best new children's book. Many of her patients have enjoyed therapy with the real-life Poppy. When she is not conducting speech sessions, she is hugging chickens!

There were several donations from local businesses for prizes and Rosedale raised \$400 to help sponsor a campership for Bearskin Meadow.

Due to the positive feedback from the families, Rosedale Highway Lions plan to continue this diabetes event annually.



Named as the Project of the Year *by a medium-sized club* was "Cornea delivery," by the North Fresno Lions Club.

The Lions Eye Bank of the San Joaquin Valley got a big boost in the 1980s from television personality Geraldo Rivera who was from Lima, Peru. Rivera realized that there was a shortage of eyesight-saving corneas for transplants. He used his huge television platform to call attention to the need.

Lion Tom Good, now of the North Fresno Lions Club, along with Lion Ralph Handly stepped up to the plate and began working with the county coroner to get usable corneas.

By 1987, the Lions Eye Bank of the San Joaquin Valley supplied 35,930 corneas for transplant and another 44,546 corneas for research for a total of 80,476! [... continued on page 7



Over time they were able to service 33 eye banks in Central America with around 100 eye banks in America sending corneas. Over about 12 years, they supplied upwards of 17,000 corneas just to Latin America. The Lions Eye Bank has also supplied Vietnam, Egypt, Syria and Thailand as well as South America.

The Lions Eye Bank of the San Joaquin Valley has become one of the largest suppliers of corneal tissue on the West Coast with nation-wide partnerships with airlines, hospitals, county coroners and funeral directors that Lion Tom Good developed personally. He also became an Eye Bank Technician and was trained to harvest corneas.

Two Changes in Dues for Clubs to Remember

- I. At last year's Convention in Montreal, your delegates voted to raise International dues \$3 per Lion per year, effective now. Please include that in your new club budget. No dues increase from 4-A2 or MD-4 this year or next.
- 2. The combined District 4-A2 and MD-4 dues will now be billed from, and paid to, our cabinet treasurer. Clubs will receive no dues notice from our Santa Barbara office.
- 3. Also send payment for 2023-24 directory ads to incoming cabinet Treasurer Diana Compo.

Third Quarter Budget Report for 4-A2

Some of the district's Training money went to training on the use of spot vision screening devices.

Only \$400 of the \$600 budgeted to support sending any Lion from any club to California's Leadership institutes was used.

We had budgeted to recognize our International Guest, ID Deb Weaverling with a Melvin Jones Fellowship, but were able to apply funds the district had already sent LCIF, so that line item looks unspent.

District awards for Zone and Region Student Speaker winners and for District Peace Poster winners have been spent.

It looks like there will be a rollover of unspent funds to next year's budget.

THE PRINCIPLES OF RECRUITMENT

I am always following what are known as the Principles of Recruitment.

Reach out to a broad constituency.

Diversity is our strength and is one of the key answers to the problem of declining membership. Anyone who follows me on Facebook knows that I am constantly out and about in a wide variety of diverse communities being an evangelist for Lionism. If you are only looking for recruits from the people who are exactly like you or are already your friends, you are severely limiting the potential for your club's growth.

2. Multiple Methods of Recruitment are Important.

Ask One definitely works as a principle if you are talking to people at one of your service events, but it can be supplemented by putting recruitment messages in social media posts, press releases to the news, or even by doing what I call "Show One" – dressing up in Lions gear and going to volunteer for other organizations who share a similar mission. I can't even begin to count how many recruits my club has gotten by us being willing to go out and show other people what it means to be a Lion by helping out at non-Lion events.

Have a simple message.

Practice your elevator speech. It needs to be simple, short and PERSONAL. Don't simply regurgitate statistics about Lionism. Tell people what inspired you to become a Lion and find a way to connect the service your club does to whatever your potential recruit is passionate about.

4. Follow Up With Your Recruits Immediately

I always contact them within 48 hours and find a way to invite them to the next service project. I avoid inviting them to meetings until they have a chance to serve. Our motto is we serve, not we meet...and most younger members are more interested in service than meetings anyway.

5. Ask Everyone to Do Something

Find out what they are passionate about and engage them immediately in a club related activity or service project surrounding their interest. If your club doesn't have something planned, empower them to help lead or create a new service project.

Wrapping up a Very Special Year **LEADERS** -Have you tried these ideas? (or will have it done by 6/30, please add whatever I have forgotten) Recognized your Lions for their successes? 7. Always have Materials Ready


I don't go anywhere without a stack of Lions applications in my back pocket. It's how I've recruited people at airports, on trips to other districts, and all around my community.

8. Always Be Recruiting -

It's become a running joke in my club, but if I talk to a community minded person for more than 5 minutes, I will have at least mentioned the possibility of them becoming a Lion at some point. I don't ever do a hard sell, with practice you will learn how to spot someone who needs more time to think about it, or it's just not right for them at that particular point in their life. No matter what though, I am inviting them out to an event or service activity, even if it's just as a volunteer so they can see what we do. If you are always recruiting, the chances of you gaining new members will significantly increase.

There you have it, the & simple steps of the Principles of Recruitment. While there is a whole lot more to the process of becoming an evangelist of Lionism, if you start there you will be well on your way to sponsoring your next member!
